We have had a shaky start to this year's Easter Art Show. We had booked into the Exhibition Hall as per usual only to be informed by Council that the hall was closed due to structural problems that will not be fixed in time for our show. Lots of looking and asking and Anita has found us the Victoria Hall which will be just fine. It's smaller, not that much smaller, but it means we won't be able to accommodate 3D pieces this year, everything else will stay the same.

Last year's show was such a fantastic show. We had a total of 346 wonderful paid entries with 99 equally as good extra entries and our sales total was 96 – an

exceptional result. We had 738 visitors through the door, it's a lot to live up to. So, let's all take a big breath and move forward. This years' show is 10 days in length, and we start the week before Easter on Friday 11th April and finishing Easter Sunday 20th April.

To make this years' show work we will need lots of artists supporting us and talking about the move. Going by last year's roster we will need about 50 volunteers to help us with this years' show. 
February



Artist Profile: Trav Hendrick

Trav Hendrick draws colourful cartoons. Born in Dandenong and living in Drouin for the past 30 years, Trav has focused his time on creating his own cartoon characters. While attending Drouin Secondary College he was diagnosed with mild autism. He finds communicating with people difficult – art is his way of conveying his feelings and emotions.

Prismacolor pencils is his preferred medium, although he has experimented with watercolour and pastel, he finds pencil and paint pens more controlling. He is self-taught, starting his work with a grey lead

pencil, then goes over the design with black ink lines and colours. During his school years his inspirations were Walt Disney and Matt Groening from The Simpson's and is inspired to turn his pets and favourite animals into cartoon characters. He has over 100 characters. Being isolated socially he has found solace in his artworks.

He sold his first artwork in his first art show he entered which gave him enormous happiness and inspired him to continue entering shows. With many encouraging awards his highlights have included being selected to exhibit in 'New Energies' Contemporary Artists of Gippsland showcasing 'Family Pets'. The Baw Baw Shire Council acquired 'Pastel Paradise' in

2004, and he also won an acquisition competition for council's bag design in 2008 titled 'Baw Baw Seasons'.

A quietly spoken man Trav has held many solo exhibitions. In recent years his cartoons have featured on mouse mats, caps and desk-top calendars. His favourite artwork is 'Medusa Revenge' that took 6 months to complete. This work has very fine detailed lines. 'Fire Fox' artworks is his original creation that he is very proud of.

Trav's dream is to turn his cartoons into animations in the next few years. &

Artist Profile: Vivienne Ortega

Vivienne Ortega enjoys painting in the real world, as she sees it, in a realistic style with both oil and acrylic paints.


While the subject of Art at school was her best, she didn't give this much importance except that as a child she drew often with her Derwent coloured pencils, her main subjects being horses. Even though she did some training in Art at Teachers College she stopped before completing, but had her interest re-ignited two years ago at Morwell U3A.

Much of Vivienne's inspiration comes from the natural world; birds, landscapes, seascapes, trees and plants. To capture these in paint Vivienne begins with printing out an image from online or a photo and considering how to translate it into a painting. Colour is of primary importance but added richness and depth comes from observing shadows, the play of light, and textures.

While Vivienne's favourite artwork is called the 'Virgin of Guadaloupe' and hangs on her wall, her work reflects her ongoing interest in the French Impressionists, but also individual artists across centuries such as Rembrandt, Constable, Turner and Australian, Frederick McCubbin.

It is interesting that aside from her passion for Art, Vivienne studied Computer Science and software development as a mature age student and hopes that one day she will challenge herself further with watercolour painting and portrait painting.

As samples of lengthier poems included in the Third Edition, here are three pieces which adopt different approaches in showing senses of location, all involving Gippsland connections, depicting places which are both local & international.

This first example has been strongly affirmed for the level of compassion it extends towards the homeless: it was written/ edited through Time to Write, a weekly Bbaa drop-in group which has been convened by Catchment's editor Rodney Williams, at Art Space 1 (Trafalgar Railway Station):

BBQ Shelter. Princes Drive

a two sided brick structure with a roof.

There are benches

a slatted arrangement bolted to the walls.

There is an eating facility

a wooden trestle table with bench seats.

There are lights

There is a gas BBQ

operated with a gold coin.

There are gardens and trees

neatly manicured fortnightly.

There is air conditioning

cooling and heating provided by nature itself.

there are no rooms, no shower, or kitchen sink, there is no privacy, it is open, with street lights blazing all night long with cars roaring by at all hours

It is home for two people, who neatly fold their bedding every morning, who pack their belongings in supermarket bags, who tidily stack their stuff in a corner.

that red silk scarf.


Today I'm on another station – in India – and I realise it's gone.

The time set aside for this new group is Tuesday mornings, 10.30am to 12.30pm at the VRI Hall in Warragul. Come and participate in these regular short workshops, take time to stitch, experiment with techniques, and materials, opportunities to share in planning.

The first mini workshop is on Tuesday, February 4. Bring a notebook and pen, two pieces of patterned fabric (20cm X 30cm), a few fabric scraps for applique, threads in three colours to match, compliment or contrast with your fabric, needles, scissors.

'Arts Assist – A Helping Hand' -The Small Grants Program



I am sending out a BIG thank you to the Bbaa committee for the Helping Hands artist grant opportunity. I was so happy to have my grant application accepted. I had been saving for a gazebo and all the associated equipment involved with it so that I could take part in the market stalls at Warragul. When I heard the announcement about the grant at the AGM, I knew that if my application was accepted it would allow me to get to the goal quicker.

As I have a small car, I needed to find a gazebo that folded up to the size of my boot. Needless to say, they are hard to find and of course more expensive.

I could have purchased a plain cover but really liked the printed stalls. However, printing was going to add extra costs but together with my savings and the grant it allowed me to have my information printed on the roof and wall and I am over the moon about how beautiful it turned out.

I wish I could have shown this in earlier newsletters but there were delays in having it custom printed. Then the other items I needed such as the leg weights and things for my merchandise were out of stock.

But the good news is it is now ready for the 2025 markets.

Thanks again Bbaa and the committee. It really has been a life changer for me.

On Saturday 23 November I drove to Cheryl Cook's home/workshop accompanied by my sister Jeanette to participate in a felting workshop. It was a very hot day, fortunately Cheryl had an air conditioner. We were anticipating a fun and productive day. Janine also joined us.

Wet Felting

Felting is a textile art that involves turning loose fibres, like wool, into a thick, soft fabric called felt.

Process

Felting is achieved by applying heat, moisture, and pressure to cause the fibres' scales to interlock and bind together.

Techniques

There are multiple techniques for felting, including wet felting and dry felting. Wet felting: Layers of animal fibres are positioned at 90-degree angles to each other and covered with warm, soapy water. The fibres are then agitated and compressed to cause them to hook together.

Materials

Many types of fibres can be felted, including wool, mohair, angora,

Uses

Felted cloth can be used to make accessories or clothes, art works

Tools

You can use a few special felting tools to start a felting project, and no machine is needed.

We started by layering white wool at 90deg angles, this was done by pulling very very gently very thin amounts of wool. After that it was a process of wetting and soaping the wool then (gently massaging with love) Cheryl's words, adding more fibres, lots of wetting and massaging, to bind all the fibres together. It is quite a process, Jeanette and I were surprised at them all and how long it took. At the end a piece is reduced to a third of the size. The process is not hard, very rewarding. We intend to use our pieces in an artwork. It was a full day of fun and enjoyment.

'Arts Assist – A Helping Hand' -The Small Grants Program



Thanks to the Baw Baw Arts Alliance Grants program I was able to access a workshop in Melbourne to learn about reduction lino printing. Jessie was at our Friday Group at Trafalgar and mentioned that the grants were available. One of the other ladies in our group had already attended this workshop and it was of great interest to me.

The reduction lino method allows you to print in multiple colours and is another way to progress my print work.

The workshop was at the Firestation Print Studio in Armadale and even the visit there was a learning experience. It was great to see how their presses were set up and how they stored their equipment and how they set up the cleaning areas.

There was also a gallery where there was artwork on display.

The workshop was led by artist Abbi Gilbert and we were taken through the steps beginning with design, how to set up the board with the Ternes Burton Clips that are the way you get the paper to be in the same place each time you add the next colour. On the day we printed the first colour.

I choose to print a simple picture I have of the Devil's Marbles in the Northern Territory. Abbi talked me through how I could enable the sky to be that bright clear blue without interfering with the yellow to orange I was intending to use on the rocks. She introduced me to making a stencil of clear plastic that I used the same clip system to shield the rock

area while I printed the blue. This was an extra technique that I wasn't expecting but very valuable to know. One of her helpers on the day suggested I do a rainbow roll in the sky ...another new thing! The rainbow roll in my work is rolling the sky from intense blue at the top and it fades as you move down the page. Some of the other participants did rainbow rolls which were a variety of colours and the results looked amazing.

Once the first colour is printed the next step is to carve away any area that you want to stay that first colour. This is the reduction part. Using the clip system when you are ready to print the next colour the paper will be on the same spot. I am ready now to print my second colour and I will be working on this in the New Year at Trafalgar Print group.

Once again thank-you to the Baw Baw Arts Alliance for supporting our art community and I would encourage anyone to take the opportunity to apply for a grant.
